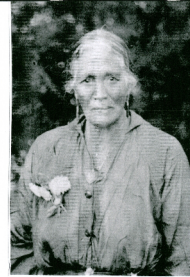


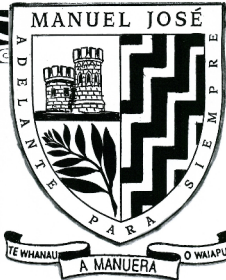
Spain, Peru, New Zealand - The South Pacific - and the route the forebears of José took from Spain to Peru, and José's from Peru to NZ.

**Our José Emblem**  
 The Crest symbolizes Justice, our Spanish roots. The Blue Bay or the Blue Hill, the principal of the Manu. The Redstone represents the heritage of the workers of the Outlines. The gold of the pattern and crown are his beaming up side over Spanish Whales - "Paterfamilias, Bona, Bona" - "The good are as in Manu" which means "Descendant of José".

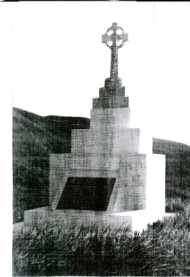
Rapata, Only child of José and Kateraina. None of his descendants.

Peti & P. McDonald, Only child of José and Maria. None of his descendants.

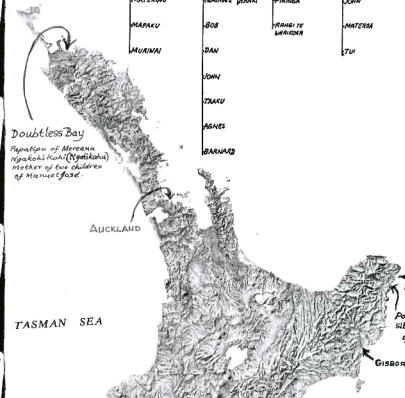
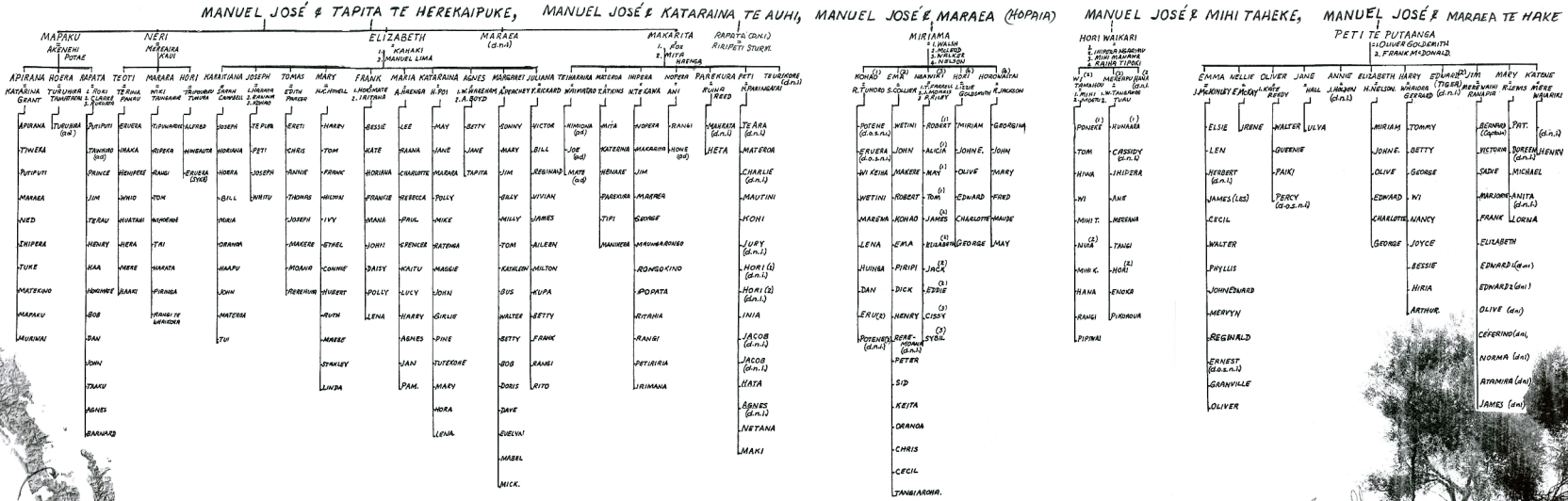


The impressive Monument that marks the grave of José, Tapita & Maria. Inaugurated 19th Nov 1991.

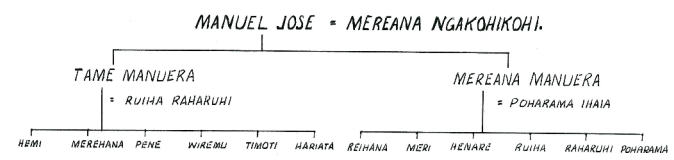

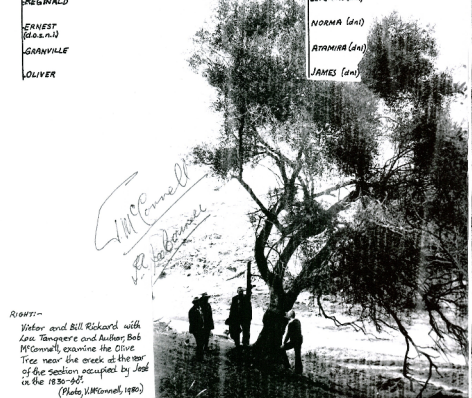
## His Wives, his Children, his Grand Children, and his Great Grand Children.
